Are you suddenly jobless? Do you have a disability?

Losing a job as a result of a business closure or workforce reduction can make for scary times – loss of income, benefits, security and confidence. For a person with a disability (or possible disability), dealing with these changes may be even scarier.

If you have a disability or think you may have a disability, you are not alone. Fifty (50) million Americans are currently living with a disability. Disabilities range from the very obvious to those that are “hidden” or “invisible” such as mental illnesses, learning disabilities, epilepsy, cancer, arthritis, brain injury and AIDS. Difficulties with reading, learning, maintaining stamina, concentration or managing new tasks may be caused by a disability.
